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Dear Supplier,

In continuation of my email of April 1, 2020, I would like to clarify our task regarding the purchase of pharmaceuticals for the treatment of diseases, where the treatment is carried out in the hospitals, but where the pharmaceuticals are mainly dispensed to the patients in the primary pharmacies.

First of all, I would like to emphasize that Denmark is in a crisis situation where it is our job to build a national emergency stock so that, in case of massive national back orders, we are still able to treat patients for up to 6 months – regardless of whether, under normal circumstances, patients receive their medication in a hospital or private pharmacy.

The Danish Medicines Agency has given Amgros the task of building an emergency stock of approx. 400 pharmaceuticals used today in both the primary and secondary sectors. The pharmaceuticals purchased in this connection must be available as free of charge dispensing in the hospitals.

The pharmaceuticals are only used in the primary sector if there is a national shortage situation where the usual distribution channels do not work and if the Danish Medicines Agency decides to distribute them through the private pharmacies.

The pharmaceuticals that Amgros may have in stock when the emergency situation ceases will subsequently be used in the hospitals. Therefore, the pharmaceuticals in question are not expected to be used in the primary sector.

The pharmaceuticals we order are purchased without a return right if they meet the usual 12-month residual shelf-life requirement upon delivery as stated in Amgros' agreements.
